PROVINCETOWN, MASSACHUSETTS
BUILT: 1970

JUST OFF MASSACHUSETTS



HARBOR HOTEL

Beginning its life as a Holiday Inn, this sleek and bright redo set between Cape Cod's breathtaking sand dunes and the artsy hive of Provincetown is a retro-chic escape with 119 guest rooms and 10 suites, along with a pool, cabana bar, fire pit, and views of Cape Cod Bay. *Rates start at \$99; harborhoteltown.com.*



CAMBRIA, CALIFORNIA
BUILT: 1960

JUST OFF CALIFORNIA



CAMBRIA BEACH LODGE AT MOONSTONE BEACH

This is a whitewashed dream of a renovation, with opulent turquoise accents in its 27 guest rooms (and sunny yellow bikes lined up along the exterior), made even more cool by the fact that it's in a part of California's Central Coast that's largely undiscovered. *Rates start at \$179; cambriabeachlodge.com.*



ATLANTIC BEACH, FLORIDA
BUILT: 1947

HOTEL PALMS

You'll want to pull up in a 1950 Chevy Bel Air, just to match the retro lines and motor-court layout of this Florida roadside classic. With 11 guest rooms that tug playfully on nostalgia (flamingo pillows) and beach house 101 (reclaimed-wood headboards), this oasis just three blocks from the sand hits all the notes, like Patti Page coming over the car radio. *Rates start at \$149; thehotelpalms.com.*



ISLAMORADA, FLORIDA
BUILT: EARLY 1950s

CASA MORADA

Originally the Sunset Inn, this midcentury concrete hotel surrounded by prosaic Florida Keys motels got an injection of sexy, sophisticated design, creating a serenely urbane escape of 16 suites with private gardens or outdoor terraces. *Rates start at \$229; casamorada.com.*
